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# President's Letter – ITHA at Your Service

The SFPD and San Francisco SAFE want to help reduce the chance of vehicle break-ins.

Here are some tips to minimize the chance of being targeted:

- Don't leave ANY personal or valuable item inside a vehicle.
- ☐ Don't leave ANY valuable item in plain view inside a vehicle.
- ☐ Lock all valuables inside the trunk before arriving at your destination.
- ☐ Leave doors locked and windows up.
- ☐ Use anti-theft devices like "The Club" or an alarm system.
- Don't leave removable stereo systems and/or GPS mapping devices - dash or windshield mounted - in your vehicle.
- □ Call 9-1-1 (553-8090 for cellular phones) if you see someone tampering with a vehicle.

# The SFPD has identified a recent trend of electronic devices robberies on Muni.

Passengers using iPhones and laptop computers on Muni vehicles are being targeted. Also being targeted are people using these devices while waiting for Muni vehicles at Muni coach stops, bus shelters, and light rail vehicle platforms.

Passengers are reminded to be aware of their surroundings while traveling on Muni. Suspects prey on victims using these devices knowing they are distracted while texting or listening to music on PDAs, using laptops, and talking on cellular phones. Passengers should be careful to limit the use of these devices and always be aware of other passengers on the vehicle.

If a passenger notices anything suspicious, the person should call the Muni complaint line, 923-6164. For emergencies or for crimes in progress, call 9-1-1 (553-8090 for cellular phones), and for non-emergencies, 553-0123.

When on the street, be alert & pay attention to your surroundings at all times. Walk with confidence & purpose.

A handbag or bookbag with a strap should not be worn across the body. It should be carried under the arm & released if grabbed. This will prevent your body from being pulled to the ground.

Have your cell phone easily accessible in case you need to call 553-8090 (SFPD emergency). Keep your cell phone fully charged at all times.

Let another person know where your are going & your expected time of return.

There is safety in numbers. Make every effort to walk with others when leaving a location. Walk in well-traveled, well-lighted streets. Do not take short-cuts through parking lots or alleyways.

Digital music players are a common target of thieves & robbers. Be wise about where you choose to use them when in public. Wearing headphones & ear buds greatly reduces your ability to hear & distracts you from potential danger.

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# Ocean Avenue Retail Corridor's Community Benefit District

The Ocean Avenue Retail Corridor is a diverse coalition of neighborhood residents, merchants and other stakeholders that are all committed to seeing Ocean become an even more vibrant, clean, safe, welcoming and thriving place in which to eat, spend time and shop. They understand that partnering with the City and other potential funders of commercial corridor revitalization is much more possible when there is a high degree of organization and a common voice that represents the interests of a wide cross-section of the neighborhood's community members.

A CBD is a special type of property assessment used to improve a specific area. The services provided are above and beyond the baseline services provided by the City. The Ocean Avenue Revitalization Collaborative (OARC) has been pursuing a CBD for the Ocean Avenue Commercial Corridor.

As of November 12, 2009, the OARC received 84 surveys from Ocean Avenue merchants, property owners, residents, students, and shoppers. Below are some of our survey results. Starting in February of 2010, proposed CBD assessments will be sent to Ocean Avenue commercial property owners. Petitions to get the Ocean Avenue CBD on ballot will also be sent out to commercial property owners.

#### Survey Results

Based on the 84 surveys collected, we found that:

- 77% of those surveyed are positive towards the CBD concept
- 74% of the merchant and property owners think a CBD will make Ocean Avenue more appealing and improve the business environment
- 61% of the merchant and property owners would sign a petition to support a CBD on Ocean Avenue

We also asked surveyees to rank the services they would like a CBD to provide.

The services that had the highest rankings in order are:

- graffiti removal
- · sidewalk and gutter sweeping



- safety issues (personal, business, property)
- sidewalk steam cleaning

The Ocean Avenue CBD plan proposes to offer 5 days of sidewalk and gutter sweeping, graffiti removal within 24 hours, monthly steam cleanings, and a new committee to address safety concerns.

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### NERT Ingleside Terraces 2010 Challenge

Make a difference for your city, your neighborhood, your family and yourself.

Have you ever thought our good luck and time to prepare for a serious earthquake may be coming to an end? Wishing, hoping, and even praying, just might not keep the tremor at bay. What is more, the San Francisco Fire Department reports, because of limited resources, we should not expect their services for several days after an emergency.

To compensate for this known inadequacy we have our NERT (Neighborhood Emergency Response Team) in Ingleside Terraces. We are fortunate that for over 20 years the San Francisco Fire Department has offered free training for any resident to help him or her prepare, protect, and help others in the event of an earthquake.

You can become NERT trained by taking six FREE CLASSES. There are stories about how two individuals trained by NERT/CERT (Certified Emergency Response Team outside of SF) helped in Haiti after the recent earthquake. One of them triaged over 300 people.

We are lucky to have an active NERT team in the Terraces, but we need more trained NERTs; the more we have, the better prepared our neighborhood will be to mobilize in case of disaster. Most important, the classes will help you and your family be prepared for that disaster, and that is vital.

The Terraces are one of the few neighborhoods that have a supply cache (supplies and tools). This year we hope to increase our supplies. We need your help to make this happen. Here are some of the items we are trying to add to our cache: a portable plastic container (a cooler would do) for tools, a collapsible shovel, knee pads, a non-contact voltage detector and a map of all surrounding neighborhoods. If you have any of these items to contribute or would like to contribute money to help buy them, or would like to sign up for the FREE CLASSES, contact JoAnn Tracht-Rawson at 415-806-8904 or by email me at joann-r at comcast.net.

I will be working closely with Bob and members of our newly formed Communications Committee to expand these services in the coming months. Should you wish to communicate to the ITHA Board directly, we also have an email address - ITHASF at gmail.com.

We also have been involved directly with our community. Paul Conroy has been our representative to the West of Twin Peaks Central Council for many years, reporting monthly at our Board meetings and bringing our feedback to our neighboring associations. At each Board meeting, to which anyone is invited, we regularly have community presentations as well as regular interactions with our District 7 Supervisor, Sean Elsbernd, and a representative from the Taraval Police station. In addition, our longtime Board member and previous VP, Norman Meunier, has just been appointed to a special SF neighborhood committee created by Capt. Gascon to bring ITHA concerns to the SFPD. More on this new activity will be forthcoming.

Finally, we very concerned with preserving the rights of our property owners and residents. As the City moves toward higher density housing and multi-tenant dwellings, neighborhoods such as ours are threatened. For years the Board has monitored building activity through our Construction Committee chaired by Norman. Two years ago we created a Design Review Committee led by Suzanne McDonnell to initiate a process to codify our neighborhood's unique character into the SF Planning and Building Code. Even as we attempt to preserve what we have within the Terraces, major changes are occurring in the 19th Avenue and Ocean Avenue corridors that we must monitor and on which we must provide feedback. We ask for your input on these issues to insure that your civic interests and property rights are preserved.
