Growing Roses in Ingleside Terraces

Based on comments by people I've talked to walking the Urbano circuit, I'm a successful rose grower in a climate that is less than rose friendly. I owe my success to three things: picking the right varieties, using a combination systemic fertilizer and anti-pest rose food once a month during the growing season (Bayer brand), and knowing how and when to prune and to trim spent blooms (dead heading).

Cecile Brunner and Ingrid Bergman are two good "SF-grows-well" varieties.

What an old fashioned gem Cecile Brunner is! In the west of Twin Peaks fog belt she grows like a weed and thrives on benevolent neglect with only an occasional spot of yellow or brown on the lower leaves in the foggiest of mid-summer months. She has a great old-time rose scent and a very long blooming season and lends herself to training into many shapes from gateway "climbers" to lacey shrubs to arched cascades and even to multi-trunked patio trees! Just look around the neighborhood and you'll see many of her uses. She'll even succeed on fewer direct sunlight hours than the modern hybrids will. Mine thrive in a semi-shady backyard and a side yard that gets only limited late morning and early afternoon sun. I never prune my Cecile Brunners as I would hybrid roses; a trimming to shape is all that is necessary, and they even take well to the use of hedge clippers to shear them into what I want. Mine are nearly evergreen here and give year-round interest. They also thrive on no extra water other than what the garden as a whole gets.

However, the roses that get the positive comments by passers-by are my Ingrid Bergmans. They have the archetypical red rose look. The first bloom, which peaks around late April with a sea of blood red eightinch blossoms across the front of my home, is the clear highlight of the year in my garden. The waves of color are typical of this variety which has a few blooms all spring, summer, and fall and sometimes even a few as late as Christmas, but really knocks your sox off in two main flushes of bloom (and some

lesser ones) during spring and summer. Although they are not quite so much at home in this neighborhood as the Cecile Brunners are, they are fairly low maintenance, with just a touch of brown and yellow spotting on the bottom leaves, which can be pulled off if they become unsightly. Ingrid Bergman is a hybrid rose, so it does need more water than the average garden shrub. The Ingrid Bergman, like most hybrid roses, thrives with severe pruning. That is, I take the mature bushes down to 4 or 5 shoots that are about 4 or 5 buds long on each bush (that means in early January you can barely see the tips of the shoots over the short boxwood hedge across the front of my home). That gives me the burst of spring growth and bloom that I am after. On occasion I have neglected this pruning, only trimming down to waist high instead, due to other commitments at the time, and although I got fair growth and bloom, I also saw that the yellow and brown spotting was more severe and was noticeable earlier in the summer.

To get repeat blooming during the growing season, you'll have to be pretty conscientious about removing dead flowers or "dead heading". Remember, a flower's purpose is to produce seed, and, once it blooms, the base of a rose will develop into a rose hip which is a seed bearing fruit. Once the bush sets enough of these hips (i.e.; has had a successful breeding season), it will stop blooming. Removing the spent flowers/hips fools the bush into blooming again and again.
