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

He was the last living SF resident who worked on this project. His career at Scott Co. Mechanical Contractors lasted almost 40 years. Jack also played baseball with the Sacramento Solons in the Pacific Coast League and was a member of the SF Old-timers Baseball Assn.

Felton Lewis White passed away peacefully June 14, 2012 at the age of 86. Beloved husband of Loretha Joyce White; loving father of Michael Henderson (deceased), Emil White and Marlena White. Stumbles Before Success: History of Our CPAB and an Invitation

Almost three years ago I was asked to join the Community Police Advisory Board for the Taraval District Police Station under then Captain Paul Chignell. This was a newly implemented project of the newest Police Chief and loosely defined as a year of service and once monthly meetings. By the time our meetings began the Taraval Station had a new Captain. The new Captain Denise Schmidt and 12 other volunteers struggled to define our mission. We selected a first project that proved to be too big for our small number and fledgling days, so we began down another path only to find ourselves with another leadership change when Captain Schmidt was promoted. We were back to square one and working to catch up when only seven months later we again needed to reboot when this Captain was reassigned.

We lost many members of our original Board during all these upheavals and we lost most of those who joined with the first change of leadership, but we found our direction. Our first order of business was to communicate the district residents' dissatisfaction with the constant leadership turnover at the Taraval Station and we were given a commitment of no less than two years for the newly appointed Captain Curtis Lum.

Under the leadership of Captain Lum we switched from members representing their specific portions of the district, to working collaboratively on district-wide concerns. We have developed a communication program

that allows the Captain to get real-time directed emails to different segments of the district when needed: whether it is a description to a particular car sector about an identified perpetrator of illegal activity in their neighborhood, or a warning about copper wire thefts targeting schools and churches, these go out to community leaders and are disseminated to their constituents by email like an old fashioned phone tree. This model was recently presented city-wide, and is now being replicated at other stations. We have also compiled much of the safety information that is available on various topics into more streamlined digital versions. This has enabled the Captain's Staff to send information that targets a particular concern to the constituency affected. For instance, a flyer was sent to all known Merchant Associations so they could print and distribute them to their customers in an effort to prevent the usual spike in auto boosting during the holiday season.

That original single year term will soon turn to three for most of your CPAB and we feel strongly that our efforts will best continue with new ideas and energy added to our efforts in the form of new members. Captain Lum has invited anyone interested in self-nominating, or in nominating another to do so by sending an email to: Curtis. Lum@sfgov.org. All nominees will be asked to go through a short interview process, and if chosen, a trial term before committing to one year of service.

Please consider offering your time and keeping this important tool for community-police communication vibrant and functioning. Your neighborhood needs you.

Raccoon Overpopulation - A Neighborhood Concern

Have you noticed that the raccoon population in the Terraces is on the rise? This increase is probably due to practices that are allowing them to multiply more rapidly than usual.

Human supplied food sources are the main contributor towards greater raccoon populations. For raccoons and other wildlife, the food supply helps determine the number of young born — more food, more litters and more babies. With overpopulation, there's actually an increase in competition for food in any given area.

Being omnivores, raccoons' diets normally include (but are definitely not limited to) insects, earthworms, snails, bird eggs, fish, rabbits, turtles, fruits, nuts and grain. Wild raccoons will eat both animal and plant material.

When wild animals are given free access to human supplied food, several problems can occur. The raccoons become bolder. Soon garbage cans, garages and even houses are raided to fulfill an ever-increasing demand for food and lodging. Raccoons can do a lot of damage, and are stronger than one might think.

In addition to property damage, raccoons can carry canine distemper, roundworm and canine rabies.

- In San Francisco, there are distemper outbreaks in raccoons every year.
- Raccoon feces harbor a parasite called Baylis ascaris procyonis, or raccoon roundworm that can cause eye and central nervous system problems in humans and animals other than raccoons.
- While no case of a raccoon with rabies has ever been recorded in the city of San Francisco, as a precaution rabies shots may be given when a pet or human has been bitten.

Tips to avoid problems for yourself and your neighbors:

- Don't leave pet food outside.
- Don't leave birdseed in feeders or on the ground overnight.
- Secure all outdoor garbage cans.
- · Close and lock pet doors at night.
- Trim overhanging branches that provide easy access to your roof
- Install L-shaped wire barriers to prevent animals from digging under decks.
- Make sure vent covers around the perimeter of the house, under/near stairs, porches and roofs are not broken or missing.
- · Cap your chimney.
- · Inspect roof, eaves and siding for damage.

The bottom line is help raccoons help themselves by letting them do what they do best-- take care of themselves.

As my article in the last Sundial noted, access to your gas valve could be critical in case of a leak, or even worse, a fire. Go out and look for that valve! These sidewalk gas shut-offs were installed many years ago after disastrous fires on Urbano and Lunado were fueled by gas lines where the shut-off was inaccessible. Those were tragic losses. After removing the lid, the valve may still be covered by 20" of soil as shown in photo 1.1 checked my own shut-off and found the lid cemented closed as a result of the recent sidewalk repair work. After a call, the contractor came and was NOT able to remove the lid even with his heavy hand tools. He will return to fix the situation.

For those of you having sidewalk repairs done, please make sure your contractor verifies a removable lid before he leaves the job. As shown in the other photo, the concrete rim around the valve lid was removed and the new concrete placed right up to the lid, thus sealing it in place. That lid needs to be removed for valve inspection.
