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Design Review Committee Updates

Ingleside Terraces evolved from developer Joseph Leonard's fascination with the 19th century City Beautiful movement, an architectural effort to improve the quality of urban life through access to fresh air, sunlight and beautification of residential areas. Leonard developed Ingleside Terraces as a residential park, replete with mini-parks, front and rear yards with park-like plantings, rear yard utilities, and, in the day, a clubhouse and tennis court.

But these days, things are looking pretty dry around the Terraces. Many of us have browning lawns and the effects of the drought are starting to show. Below are some tips to help save your current plants and some ideas to make your yard more drought tolerant.

Lawns – Less is more in a drought. Mow your lawn as little as possible as longer grass helps shade it and retains moisture. Use the highest setting on the mower and wait until grass is 3-4 inches tall. Watering for a short amount of time is a myth as it causes plants to get thirsty faster and more water evaporates. For best results, water for a longer period of time less frequently (ideally between 9 pm and 6 am) and be sure you aren't watering the street or driveway. Consider replacing non-essential turf with ground cover and mulches.

Plants – One thing you can do to help plants in a drought is prune them back by a third so the plant needs less water. Other good things to do are to remove dead or dying branches, snip off dying flowers and cut out any area that looks like it could have pests or disease. Keep the weeds at bay so they can't steal water from the plants you want to grow. Don't fertilize as fertilizers are essentially salts that will pull water from roots and dehydrate your plants. Water plants a couple of times a week and use I-2 inches of mulch to keep roots cool and moist.

If you are ready to re-think your lawn, remember that the San Francisco Planning Code and the City's Design Review Standards require all front yard setbacks to be appropriately landscaped. At least 20 percent of the front setback area must be unpaved and devoted to plant materials. See, Guide to the San Francisco Green Landscaping Ordinance at http://www.sf-planning.org. Here are a few drought resistant garden ideas:

Succulents – They need very little or no water and grow and grow with little to no care. Another great

thing about succulents is you can literally break off a flower and plant it stem down, water it a little and it will grow.

Rosemary, lavender, sage and many other plants are all drought resistant and, once established, will not need any additional water.

No-mow lawns – today there are different types of natural grasses available that you can add to your garden. You can also put in a no-mow lawn. This grass seed grows to 3-4 inches long and requires no mowing.
